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oreword and Introduction

Foreword

- 1- For more than 20 years now, Africa Development Interchange Network (ADIN) has been on the move, volunteering for the better of people of the grassroots. The organization's ambition to carry up the voices of those who otherwise would be unheard at the global level is well on track in 2009, as was the case the year before and hopefully will still be for all the years ahead.
- 2- No challenge will ever stop our peaceful action in favor of a better livelihood in Africa, building mainly on our own resources in a sustainable way. As we move on, we bear in mind that part of or all of the solutions to what ever problem we encounter, most of the times, probably lies at our feet. ADIN's action is born by the high spirit and resolution that, before looking for help outside, it is better to check right down and start capitalizing on existing assets. Africa is probably the most gifted continent in the World and we the people of Africa have the duty to convert our resources into prosperity for all.
- 3- Friends may help from outside, but we have to be strong inside to ensure that, we always co-operate rather than beg for favor. Bringing together local energies in priority and using possible outside support as an accelerating fuel for development, is the approach of our network.
- 4- This Executive Annual Report (EAR) gives a summary of activities achieved in 2009 with regard to the work plan agreed upon for the year. It gives contracted entries of all the material contained in the Detailed Annual Report (DAR), including the following: the ADIN 2009 Work Plan, the ADIN 2009 Budget and a financial statement for the year.

Introduction and Context

- 5- The global socio-economic situation has been marked in past years by a number of factors and reasons for concern. As protracted poverty goes on in developing countries with great toll, nothing seems to go in the right direction with regard to chances to achieve the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) by the target date of 2015. 2009 was another year of challenge to be added to many others, during which the World witnessed stages that necessarily would strongly influence any policy or strategy for development:
 - The WTO Doha Round failure, with no good result achieved during the last negotiation session in Geneva:
 - The outcome of the Doha FfD and MDGs Review Conference, including the reaffirmation of the Monterrey Consensus, the acknowledgement of the need for innovative financing mechanisms, a call for a United Nations Conference at the

highest level, to examine the impact of the global financial and economic crisis on development;

- The UN Conference on the Financial and Economic Crisis and its Impact on Development which stressed the fact that, a better follow-up mechanism should be set up for the implementation of the outcome in particular, as well as on the Monterrey Process at large, through a Working Group that would be reporting to the UN General Assembly;
- Challenges and opportunities created by the global financial crisis for Africa, in terms of a new spirit in international relations, considering that the crisis has unveiled the weaknesses of the neo-liberal school of thought that nurtured the conditionality attached to financing for development;
- The IMF Governance Reform prospects which stems from acknowledgment by all that, the traditional system has failed and needs to be adjusted urgently, with regard to which, the G20 took a number of initiatives and moves showing their understanding of the need for changes, ironically opposed to their traditional reluctance to reform the governance of the Bretton Woods Institutions;
- The outcome of the Belem World Social Forum, which in opposition to Davos, where rich nations seemed to pledge for a status-quo, was a real scream of hope from the bottom, to say that things have to change;
- The Accra Action Plan, which followed the Paris declaration and other relevant initiatives on Aid Effectiveness with its five pillars, including: (1) **Appropriation** whereby countries have to take ownership of and the lead in designing development policies, (2) **Harmonization** meaning that all donors need to work hand in hand and ensure coherence in their interventions, (3) **Alignment**, referring to coherence with regard to all stakeholders in the framework of aid,.(4) **Results oriented** actions programmed from the real needs of the people and (5) **Mutual accountability** whereby donors and recipients are expected to account for what they do while they provide or receive assistance;
- The West and Central Africa Regional Strategic Meeting On The Way Forward To the Doha Review Conference On Financing For Development (FfD), which came out with the following core areas of actions:
 - Commonwealth Foundation to consider governance in their programmes for Africa;
 - CSOs to work in synergy and identify personalities and organizations that could serve as liaison between the CSOs and development institutions;
 - CSOs to establish friendly ties with the government and to meet frequently with the government to discuss burning issues affecting the country;

- CSOs to draw up an African agenda from the global agenda to reform the IFIs:
- Youths to be considered as a major component in every negotiation or process;
- Need for Policy that will liberalize access to financial markets in Africa;
- An interface to be set between CSOs and the African Union, ECOWAS, ECCAS and CEMAC;
- High level advocacy and lobbying by CSOs during regional events;
- Agenda that takes into consideration the rights of the people of the grass roots;
- More education of masses especially at the grassroots, through comedies and theatre performances;
- Regional institutions to be more involved in development issues;
- CSOs in international networks must disseminate all actions carried at national level through: Communication and follow up, Information sharing and Partnerships;
- Civil Society Networks to be organized in thematic areas;
- Central Africa CSOs to participate in West African Civil Society Forum events to gather ideas for an Umbrella Civil Society Forum (UCSF) in the CEMAC region;
- CSOs to exploit AU ECOSOC which is the people centred organ of the AU.
- The ADIN proposal for a sustainable relationship format between the BWI and African Civil Society, which was recently made formal by a letter to the World Bank with a two fold proposal:

1- The idea of an African Community Development Fund (ACDF)

This would be in the framework of World Bank interaction with the Civil Society and People at the grassroots level. Any existing similar initiative at the World Bank not withstanding, this Community Development Fund would be dedicated to funding community designed and managed projects in poor countries, leaving total initiative to communities and people at the grassroots through Civil Society Organizations.

This would not mean totally putting governments into brackets, but rather opening a relatively small scale parallel innovative line of assistance to the poor, involving the Civil Society more directly. A monitoring mechanism would be activated to avoid any deviation. The scheme would be part of a continuous interaction framework between the World Bank (WB) and the Civil Society in Africa. It is imaginable that the level of funding to mobilise here be a set percentage of the World Bank's total contribution to Development.

2- Institution of a World Bank / African Civil Society Conference for Development at Community level

The event would be held on a constant basis every year in a view to opening a discussion platform to people of the grassroots on the impact of the World Bank's activities and assistance for development. The outcome of the conference would be submitted to a follow-up mechanism with quarterly reports that eventually, will fuel the Civil Society Policy Forum.

African Civil Society Organisations would thus be able to gather periodically to assess the contribution of the World Bank to development, as perceived by people at the grassroots. Yaoundé, Cameroon could be the first venue to host this conference which would move from one country to another and our organization, Africa Development Interchange Network (ADIN) could work on the field with the World Bank to ensure smooth logistical organization.

- The April 2009 Commonwealth Washington meeting on debt sustainability, where Cameroon's Finance Minister Delegate, Mr. Pierre Titti, the 2009 Chair of the Commonwealth Ministerial Debt Sustainability Forum (CMDSF), presided over a multi-stakeholder meeting bringing together, a few Commonwealth Finance Ministers and participants from the Global Civil Society and International Organizations to discuss alternative policies and strategies to face the crisis and alleviate poverty;
- The Report on the IMF Global Civil Society Consultation on the 4th pillar of Governance Reform, which raised the issue that the IMF should be a more effective part of the overall system of global governance, considering its status as a specialized agency of the UN system;
- The Cuernavarca (Mexico) meeting of the International Working Group on Trade-Finance Linkages, which drew a three year action plan, in light of the events agenda of all major global and regional organizations or groupings, including the UN, the G20, the WTO, the African Union, the European Union and others;
- The Cameroon Civil Society's contribution to global processes, which has been very active these past years, specifically with ADIN, within the Global Social Economy Group (GSEG), in working relationship with the UN Non Governmental Liaison Service and with other Cameroonian Civil Society Organizations such as the COSADER, within the Debt Effectiveness process and the Cameroon Youth and Students Forum for Peace (CAMYOSFOP) on youth issues in the related African Union process;
- Cameroonian Youth Face to Face Consultation on the theme of the African Union Heads of State 13th Ordinary Summit: "Investing in Agriculture for Economic Growth and Food Security", which brought together 18-25 year old youngsters and which resulted in strong recommendations from the youth to the Cameroon Government and to the African Union, with a core message on the need to

Targets

- Capitalize on gathered experience from previous years in the fight against poverty;
- Use development facilities in potentially rich African regions to produce needed resources in potentially poor regions, with agriculture as the main engine;
- Assist and provide African community based organizations with capacity building services for development;
- Gather and turn any foreign aid or assistance into long-term socio-economic development asset;
- Promote actions for a safe environment in Africa.

Procedure

Activities are undertaken within specific programmes, each of them part of a global strategy for Africa.

Programmes

• Agriculture for development in Africa (ADA)

- Implementation of agriculture projects in agric favourable regions for mass production to supply markets, to be developed in other regions within a resources interchange system;
- Development of agriculture product processing and markets in less agric favourable regions;
- Designing pioneer projects for the use and spreading of agriculture research results, in collaboration with Research Centres and Institutes in Agriculture for Development.

Health care for Development in Africa (HDA)

- Implementation of health care projects in Africa, through information and training in schools and rural areas (fight against malaria and AIDS in particular);
- Convey resources yielded from investment projects within ADIN process, or raised from international help organisations towards improving health conditions in Africa.

Education for Development in Africa (EDA)

- Implementation of better education in Africa, through assistance to populations in need (infrastructure, training and training capacity building services);
- Convey resources yielded from investment projects within ADIN process, or raised from international help organisations towards education.

• Trade for Development in Africa (TDA)

- Encouragement and facilitation of exports for African commodities, through technical and financial assistance to business operators;
- Search and exploitation of business opportunities for good partnership between Africans and foreign partners;
- Setting of well adapted facilities and support structures within ADIN, to convey assistance and help from international organisations towards the development of trade;

 Design and make efficient negotiation tools available for African countries for use within the WTO process.

Sports for Development in Africa (SDA)

- Implementation of projects related to football and other sports throughout Africa;
- Encouraging contributions from African football and other sports professionals, within ADIN process, to the development of sports infrastructure in Africa;
- Encouragement and assistance of African Diaspora football and other sports professionals to prepare their return home within a development project, through the ADIN investment process.

• 10 USD for Africa Solidarity Programme (10 \$ ASP)

- Implementation of a world-wide fund raising, from all benefactors of African origin (minimum of 10 US dollar per individual);
- Investment of raised funds in development projects in Africa, with the ambition of targeting all areas of poverty, in a view to alleviating that social problem everywhere on the continent.

Women for Development in Africa (WDA)

- Sensitization of the African communities on the importance of Women's contribution to Development;
- Encouragement of actions, where ever necessary, to guarantee fair gender policy and women's rights in Africa;
- Implementation of specific projects in favour of women and children, with the help of international organizations working in that field.

• Safe Environment for Development in Africa (EDA)

- Sensitization of the African communities on the importance of long term management of Natural resources and the safeguarding of environmental assets;
- Implementation of specific environmental projects in collaboration with international organizations working in that field;

- Development of partnerships with African City Councils for implementation of clean city development projects.
- Millennium Development Goals Monitoring in Africa (MDG-MA)
 - Advocating MDGs awareness at grassroots level by translating and conveying the Millennium Development Goals' message to local communities;
 - Contributing to MDGs appraisal and reporting process, with the aim of catching the real effect of development and poverty alleviation actions as felt at grassroots level (voice of the people).

Expected results

- Improvement of average income level in Africa.
- Famine and poverty alleviation.
- Reduction of unemployment.
- Conflict settlement through economic achievements.
- Establishment of an African economic solidarity chain.
- Creation of an economic development engine through savings and investment in well targeted fields.

Means and operational resources

Financial

- Africa Solidarity and Savings Fund (ASSF), a financial Institution for micro projects that later shall be raised into a micro development bank for people at grassroots level.
- Foreign help and solidarity contributions.
- Contribution from ADIN projects and affiliated structures.

Cultural

- World wide communication.
- Intellectual voluntary contribution (assistance from consultants).
- Annual international conference and periodical executive meetings.
